## Omega British Military “Dirty Dozen” – WW2 – Calibre 30T2 – Stainless Steel – Broad Arrow

Part of the highly regarded and widely collected “Dirty Dozen” group of British military watches produced during the Second World War, this Omega example represents one of the twelve manufacturers contracted by the Ministry of Defence to supply timepieces for military personnel throughout the war.

Condition is everything with Dirty Dozen watches, and this example stands out as a well-preserved and honest survivor that retains its original dial — something becoming increasingly difficult to find.

### Condition Report

Case: Polished at some stage in the past but remains in remarkable condition with strong shape.

Dial: Appears original with even natural patina; Arabic numerals, minute track, Omega logo and Broad Arrow all intact.

Crystal: Plexiglass in excellent condition with no notable marks or scratches.

Overall: A very strong example with the most important element — an original, untouched dial.

### Working Order

Running exceptionally well for its age.

Serviced in House in June 2026

Keeping time at approximately +15 seconds per day.

Previously clearly well cared for.

### Our View

While the Omega Dirty Dozen is not the rarest of the group (with estimates of around 25,000 produced), good original examples are becoming increasingly difficult to source — particularly those that have avoided dial refurbishment.

Yes, this watch shows evidence of period service components, which is entirely correct and expected for a military-issued tool watch. Taken as a whole, this represents a wonderful example at the more accessible end of the Dirty Dozen market — ideal as a first entry into the collection, a historically significant daily wearer, or a cornerstone piece of a broader military watch collection. With a finite number in existence, now truly is the time to own one.
